Project update – Waterloo Station

July 2024

Sydney Metro is Australia's biggest public transport project.

Services started in May 2019 in the city's North West with a train every four minutes in the peak. Metro rail will be extended into the CBD and beyond to Bankstown, with new CBD metro railway stations at Crows Nest, Victoria Cross, Barangaroo, Martin Place, Gadigal and Waterloo and new metro platforms at Central, and then onto Bankstown in 2025.

The new Waterloo integrated station development includes construction of the new Waterloo metro station by John Holland, while a joint venture between John Holland and Mirvac will deliver the Waterloo Metro Quarter, including buildings above and next to the station.

Upcoming work in July around Waterloo Station

Construction activity and train testing at Waterloo Station is taking place 24 hours a day, seven days a week, including testing and commissioning within the tunnels. An indicative work schedule for July is listed below.

Standard construction hours are Monday to Friday, 7am to 6pm and Saturday, 8am to 6pm

Waterloo Station

- Ongoing testing and commissioning.
- Installation of public art.

Wellington, Buckland, Cope and Raglan streets and Botany Road

- Utility work on Cope, Raglan and Wellington streets and Botany Road.
- Civil work around the perimeter of Waterloo Station including installation of new road signage, new kerbs, drainage, garden beds, footpath upgrades, road pavement and completion of the boundary wall on Cope Street.
- Partial road closure on Raglan Street to carry out civil works, water main upgrades and traffic control signals works. A separate notification has been distributed with closure information, dates, and times.

Emergency exercises at Waterloo Station

The metro operator, Metro Trains Sydney (MTS) is undertaking a range of train testing activities to prepare for the opening of the metro line between Chatswood and Sydenham. As part of this testing program, they will be running two emergency exercises at Waterloo Station involving a large number of staff members on **Friday 5 July and Friday 12 July 2024.**

You may see a crowd of people gathering at the station entrance from around 8am in the morning and leaving around 2pm in the afternoon. Emergency services may also be present. The exercises will be held inside the station and on other parts of the network and will not cause any disruption to surrounding areas.







Public domain and intersection upgrades for Waterloo Station

As part of the Waterloo Station works upgrades to the public domain and intersections on Cope, Raglan and Wellington streets will be completed. Civil work around the perimeter of Waterloo Station including new kerbs, parking, pedestrian crossings, drainage, garden beds, footpath upgrades, and installation of new traffic signals on Raglan Street. Line marking and parking signage updates are currently being installed.

Cope Street

Cope Street is scheduled to reopen with a redesigned layout. The new layout will feature a pedestrian crossing, parking areas including spaces for disabled parking, a Kiss and Ride zone, and a designated Taxi Zone. Additionally, a new speed limit of 40km per hour will be implemented on Cope Street.

Raglan Street

On the corner of Cope and Raglan streets new traffic lights will be installed.

Wellington Street

A new pedestrian crossing will be constructed at the intersection of Cope and Wellington Street. Additionally, modifications will be made to the parking on Wellington Street between Botany Road and Cope Street to accommodate the new bike lane by relocating the loading zone.

Waterloo over station development

- Sydney Water Main upgrade works along Botany Road between the Church and Raglan Street. Pedestrian footpath closed for the duration of these works from **Monday to Friday, 8.00am- 3.00pm**
- Delivering and removing equipment, large machinery, and materials.
- Scaffold installation on the south station box.
- Concrete pouring, steel fixing and formwork for building structures.
- Crane lifts from Wellington Street, Botany Road and Raglan Street work zones.
- Concrete pumping from Wellington Street, Botany Road and Raglan Street work zones.
- Hoarding installation and graphic installation.

Upcoming out of hours work (OOHW) in July around Waterloo Station

Work taking place outside standard construction hours (OOHW) Monday to Friday from 6pm to 7am, Saturday and Sunday from 7am to 8am and 6pm to 7am.

Testing and commissioning.


Wellington, Cope, Buckland and Raglan streets, Botany and Henderson roads

- Utility work on Cope, Raglan and Wellington streets and Botany and Henderson roads.
- Traffic control signals (TCS) work:
 - These activities will include traffic control, pedestrian diversions, potholing, road sawing, excavation, pipe and conduit installation, cable installation, removal of redundant services and reinstatement of the area.
- Resurfacing works on Botany Road between Raglan and Wellington streets.

What to expect

- Equipment used will include, but is not limited to, hand-held and electric tools, jack-hammers, welders,
 power drills, excavators, compaction equipment, elevated work platforms, concrete trucks, concrete mixers
 and pumps, sweeper, cranes, light and heavy vehicles, pavement cutters, vacuum trucks, asphalt
 compactors, piling rig and vibratory roller.
- Due to the nature of the work, nearby residents may be able to hear noise and feel vibration from some of
 the work. The project team will limit these impacts wherever possible. A range of mitigation measures are in
 place to meet the project's approval conditions and reduce noise, including turning off equipment when not
 in use and, where possible, equipping machinery with non-tonal movement alarms and using acoustic
 sheeting. Respite from high impact work such as hammering is also provided. This includes three hours of
 work, followed by one hour respite.
- Temporary traffic changes will be in place for the safety of workers and the community during this work, including reduced speed limits, footpath, removal of parking and lane closures. The Cope Street closure (between Raglan and Wellington streets) is ongoing.
- To complete some utility work, power or water outages may be required. These will be carried out at the direction of the utility company and any impacted residents will be notified.
- Updates about out-of-hours work will be distributed via email rather than letterbox drop. To ensure you receive these updates, sign up to our email distribution list.
